


## Park Hours

 Bayshore Waterfront Park is open every day of the year from dawn to dusk, free of charge.



**From Garden State Parkway:** Take Exit 117 (North and Southbound), bear left and follow Hwy 36 South for 5 miles. Take jughandle to turn left onto Main Street, Port Monmouth. Follow Main Street to Wilson Avenue, turn left and continue to end. Turn left onto Port Monmouth Road; follow to park entrance.

**From State Hwy 36:** Traveling northbound, turn right onto Main Street, Port Monmouth; traveling southbound, take jughandle to turn left onto Main Street, Port Monmouth. Follow Main Street to Wilson Avenue, turn left and continue to end. Turn left onto Port Monmouth Road; follow to park entrance.

**From State Hwy 35:** Traveling northbound, turn right onto Laurel Avenue; traveling southbound, take jughandle to turn left onto Laurel Avenue. Follow to Middle Road, turn right. Middle Road becomes Main Street. Follow and cross Hwy 36. Follow Main Street to Wilson Avenue, turn left and continue to end. Turn left onto Port Monmouth Road; follow to park entrance.

## Welcome to Bayshore Waterfront Park

*At 227 acres, this scenic park is home to a 300-foot fishing pier, beautiful views of the New York City skyline, and the historic Bayshore Activity Center. It provides visitors with a quiet place for a picnic, boating, fishing or birding, as well as a taste of history. The park is located on the beaches of Port Monmouth and sits adjacent to the Monmouth Cove Marina.*

## Park History

Bayshore Waterfront Park was acquired by Monmouth County in 1988. In 1998 the Bayshore Activity Center was acquired from Middletown Township as a park addition. It is one of the oldest surviving houses in the Bayshore region with ties to the area's settlement, as well as maritime history. The oldest section of this large frame house dates back to the early 1700s, with multiple additions built by the Seabrook and Wilson families between the 1700s and 1800s. The waterfront setting of this valued community landmark gives way to views of the New York City skyline and Raritan/Sandy Hook Bay.

## Fishing

The Park System welcomes the public to fish year-round off the park's wheelchair accessible 300-foot pier or from the sandy shores. The NJ Saltwater Angler registry now requires all anglers 16+ to register online (for free) to fish in marine and fresh tidal waters of NJ. ## Boating

Boats such as kayaks, canoes, and windsurfers (as well as other car-top vessels) are permitted at Bayshore Waterfront Park. Because the park does not have a boat ramp, boaters should be aware that they must carry their vessel(s) from the parking lot to the water.

## Nature Programs & Other Activities

Bayshore Waterfront Park is a conveniently located spot to enjoy the sun, scenery and surf. A view of the bay sets the perfect ambience for picnicking, followed by a stroll on the beach. A variety of coastal nature programs and activities are conducted in & around Bayshore Activity Center, where exhibits about the bay environment and culture are also on display. ## Wildlife

Recent wildlife sightings include the Baltimore oriole, egrets, ring-necked pheasant, red fox and the endangered short-nose sturgeon (a type of fish). But one of the most interesting sightings is that of harbor seals which may be found lounging on the beach or on the ice during the months of November through March each year.



## Protect Your Parks



## Dunes

More than just a clean place for fun in the sun, the park is something increasingly rare at the Jersey Shore: a protected ecological habitat. The Park System attempts to stabilize the shoreline by planting erosion-fighting beach grass. These planted areas act as a natural barrier against severe storms and serve as habitat for threatened bird and plant species. As such, certain areas of the beach are sometimes closed and removed from the beach raking schedule to “let natural processes prevail.” This is done so that various native species may survive and thrive undisturbed.

## Marina

Monmouth Cove Marina neighbors Bayshore Waterfront Park. As a multi-service facility for boaters, the marina is home to 154 wet slips (3 available for personal watercraft), which are supplied with electricity and water, concrete floating docks, transient dockage and a fuel dock. The marina also offers year-around boat storage, both on land and wet/rack depending on the season, using 58-rack storage bunks, 15-ton Acme Marina Hoist and Taylor forklift.
